

Why children need to be protected online



Children have rights

- to be protected offline and online
- to use the internet safely
- to information, education, privacy and recreation
- to express views on the matters, including by use of the technology

Key Concepts

- The internet could be Good, Bad and Ugly
- Online harms can be inter-connected with offline harms
- Protectionism vs Empowerment

Gravity of Online Child Abuse & Exploitation

- Could be as harmful as offline abuse
 & exploitation or more harmful
- Images/videos could be shared, tampered or misused
- Harmful posts can reach many people in anywhere in a short time
- Once in the internet, almost impossible to fully remove
 -> long lasting impact



Online Abuse is Real - Offline Impacts

- Cyber bullying and offline bullying
- Cyber grooming and offline sexual abuse and exploitation
- Offline abuse could be filmed and shared online, including for sextortion
- Intimate partner violence and sharing of non-consensual abusive images
- Internet use for human trafficking
- Internet use for child/early/forced marriage








Exposure to Sexual Contents

Survey on the Impacts of COVID-19 on Protection of Children and Young People Online, Unicef and ChildSafeNet, 2020



1 in 3 girls/young people visited sexual sites



1 in 2 boys/young people visited sexual sites

Gaps



Knowledge - very few research studies and data



Awareness - Lack of understanding of manifestations and gravity of online abuse and exploitation of children and young people



Law Enforcement - Inadequate legal measures and weak law enforcement



Policies - Policies and directives are either not comprehensive or implemented effectively. Need amendment.



Response Mechanisms and Support System - not adequate and weak
